The UMC At Work

It's starting to fade into our memories now, but the tsunami disaster in Southeast Asia occurred just over 2 months ago. While we were horrified at the destruction that was caused, I was also very encouraged to see so many of you respond with prayers and financial support to the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). I also recall having conversations with many of you about UMCOR and the work that our relief agency undertakes. So here's a brief update on UMCOR's efforts on the tsunami, as well as some disaster relief information in general.

Since 1940, UMCOR has been serving as the outreach and relief arm of our church. We have engaged in disaster relief, refugee aid, and anti-poverty programs in nearly 100 countries. As part of the General Board of Global Ministries, UMCOR maintains a corps of trained disaster response specialists for quick reinforcement of national efforts (much like the Red Cross), while also keep a supply of relief materials warehoused when and where required.

With specific regard to the tsunami disaster response, UMCOR has been actively working with the Methodist Church of Indonesia to provide shelter, clean water and food, and sanitary services to the disaster victims. UMCOR is also working to set up long-term recovery centers in Indonesia and Sri Lanka.

It is important to know, too, that 100% of financial donations to UMCOR go directly to the disaster relief areas. UMCOR's administrative expenses are paid through the budget of the General Board of Global Ministries. So while any donation made directly to UMCOR benefits victims world wide, a portion of any money you give to Herndon UMC also goes to support the General Board's budget, including UMCOR.

I would encourage you to check out the United Methodist website at www.umc.org to learn more about UMCOR and all the General Boards and Agencies of the UMC. UMCOR is also still accepting donations for the tsunami disaster, as well as all their other relief programs around the world.

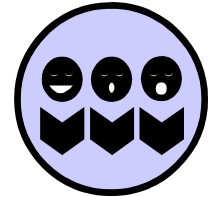

Mission Kits for Konference

HUMC is participating in the annual preparation of conference kits for distribution to needy people worldwide through Church World Service (CWS). Because of the recent tsunami disaster in South Asia, CSW is emphasizing the need for Health and School kits this year.

Health Kits contain: one hand towel, one washcloth, one comb, one metal nail file or nail clipper, one bar of soap (bath size), one toothbrush, one tube of toothpaste (4 to 7 ounces), and six Band-Aids. Seal all items in a one gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure. Note: Clippers may now be included instead of nail files. The Hand towel must be small enough to fit into the bag with the other items. A donation of \$12 will also allow CWS to provide a health kit.

Layette Kits contain: six cloth diapers, two shirts, two washcloths, two gowns or sleepers, two diaper pins, one sweater or sweatshirt, and two receiving blankets (one can be a knitted blanket). Note: Diapers have been increased from 4 to 6 and a Remsen knitted blanket is no longer specified. Bundle these items inside one of the receiving blankets and secure with diaper pins. A donation of \$35 to CWS will also provide a new layette.

School Kits contain: one pair of blunt scissors, pads or notebooks of ruled paper approximately 8 1/2x11-inches (containing 150-200 sheets of paper), one 30-centimeter ruler (12 inches), one pencil sharpener, six new pencils with erasers, one large eraser, 12 sheets of colored construction paper, one box of 24 crayons, and one 12x14-inch cloth bag with cloth handles and a closure (Velcro, snap, or button). Pack the items in the cloth bag and secure contents with the closure. Note: The bags must now have a closure. A donation of \$11 will also allow CWS to buy school supplies and assemble the kit.

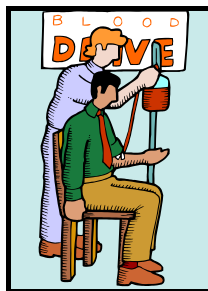

Monetary contributions for kits or shipping fees should be in the form of checks made out to HUMC, designated "Konference Kits". Our pastors will deliver the kits to Annual Conference. This year participating churches are asked to add \$1.00 per kit to cover processing/shipping. Additional information may be found in the February edition of the **Advocate** (p. 18).

Please return your kits as soon as possible, but **no later than June 5th**. Our pastors will deliver the kits to Annual Conference on June 12th.

Profiles in Faith Fred and Mary Jo Klinefelter

Fred and Mary Jo Klinefelter have been members of Herndon United Methodist Church since 1976, having joined the church shortly after moving to Virginia. Fred is originally from York, Pennsylvania where he and his family were members of the Reformed Church. He graduated from Penn State University and served in the Army during the Korean War before embarking on a 42 year career with the U.S. Geological Survey.

Mary Jo was born in Clinton, Tennessee, but spent her early school years in Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Her father was a minister in the Church of the Nazarene so there were several moves for her family. After completing degrees at Trevecca Nazarene University and George Peabody College for Teachers in Nashville, she began teaching in Ohio where she met Fred.

They were married on September 3, 1960 and began years of moving – mostly in the eastern United States – but two years in the western states as Fred’s work doing field surveying and mapping required. Fred and Mary Jo decided to relocate to the USGS Headquarters in Reston in the fall of 1975 after Fred had spent 23 years doing field work with the mapping division. Their three daughters were in elementary school and they needed to be settled. They rented a house in Sterling until May of 1976 when they purchased a house in Herndon.

While in the field, they attended churches of many denominations, often with little choice because of the work location. In their last assignment in Albany, Georgia they attended a large United Methodist church which had many activities for both children and adults. When they began seeking a new “church home” here in Herndon, they found that most of the churches had very limited programs for children, including HUMC, but they chose this church because of the friendly people. They have been active members since joining the church.

Over the years Fred has served on the Pastor Parish and Nominating Committee; as a Sunday School teacher; as church treasurer and assistant for over ten years; and on the Church, Society and Missions Committee as the coordinator for the Blood Drives since the early 1990’s. He now serves with the church ushers and also helps with many of the church projects sponsored by the United Methodist Men, the Preschool and other church organizations.

Mary Jo has served on most of the church committee at one time or another. She has been Lay Leader, United Methodist Women president, chaired Worship and Staff Parish Relations Committees, and chair of the Council of Ministries for four years. She worked at the YWCA Preschool for 18 years, and was director while it met at the Herndon United Methodist Church from 1979 to 1994. After the church began operating its own preschool in 1994, she served on the Preschool Committee for six years. At present she serves on the Prayer Committee and the UMW Executive Board.

Their three daughters had a great experience growing up in HUMC and enjoyed the opportunities it offered. Two of them, Pamela and Tina, now live in Colorado. Their oldest daughter, Tammy, lives with her family in Herndon and teaches in our Sunday School and serves as treasurer for the Preschool. Tammy and Joe have gifted Fred and Mary Jo with two grandsons – Jared and Cameron.

Computer Systems Upgraded

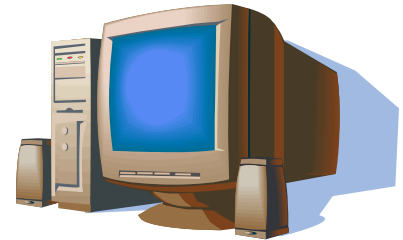
As the church staff has grown, and our use of technology continues to expand, the leadership of the church decided that we needed to establish a more formal information technology approach. Formed as a subcommittee of Trustees and Staff Parish, the IT Subcommittee was charged late last year to assess our current technology infrastructure. They were asked to make plans to ensure that this infrastructure will enable our ministry to be more interconnected with the church members, allowing more real-time conversations between the staff and youth, and looking to the future of sharing more of our ministry through the internet.

The first phase of that plan is now underway. As a result, you will notice new computers for each of the permanent staff members. These systems were underwritten by an anonymous donation, and will enable a much more powerful set of tools to be used by the staff. We also are migrating our critical membership and contributions information into a commercially supported product that is already in use for our financial systems.

As we convert over to the new systems, we appreciate your understanding if your information needs to be updated. We anticipate additional flexibility with the new system, but are taking extra care to ensure that new privacy and legal protections of your information are supported. Our review and formalization of these policies of the church will soon be available for your review. We also will have a part-time support person on site each week to ensure the systems are being supported and backed up appropriately. Our partnership with Herndon High school may allow us to leveraging their excellent Tech Aid staff to meet the needs of the church and also be a way of continuing to build our outreach to students.

Hopefully you have started to see what technology can do for the church. We have a very active email distribution lists for the Prayer Chain and basic church information. On the horizon are innovations like a more real-time updated Church calendar on our Web site, more real-time interconnections with staff members for youth and remote members, and sharing recorded services through the internet.

We are profoundly indebted to Dawn Walker for helping us to establish an outstanding technology foundation that will allow us to now focus on becoming a more real-time interconnected congregation. Prayer: Thank you, Lord Jesus Christ, for the gifts of physical, emotional, and spiritual well-being. We bring before you our individual and collective needs...”

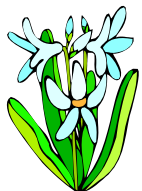

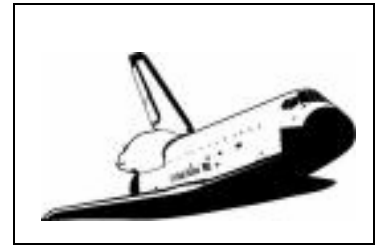

Growing Through Giving

C.S. Lewis Institute

Come, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be put into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured back to you. (Luke 6:38)

Commitment Ministries would like to share the following article from the C.S. Lewis Institute which describes struggles the author C.S. Lewis faced regarding financial giving.

What is your attitude toward giving your money to the work of God and to the needs of others? Like many of us, C.S. Lewis experienced some struggles in this area: "I'm a panic-y person about money myself (which is a most shameful confession and a thing dead against our Lord's words) and poverty frightens me more than anything else, except large spiders and tops of cliffs..." Yet Lewis also realized that his fears were a hindrance to faith. "For many of us the great obstacle to charity lies not in our luxurious living or desire for more money; but in our fear – fear of insecurity. This must often be recognized as temptation."

The temptation to which Lewis refers is that of trusting in ourselves and our material resources for security in life, instead of trusting God. This is a perennial temptation for our human nature. The problem, of course, is not what we have, but what has us. And, our attitude toward giving is a very good barometer of what has us – where our trust really lies. Thus, for the sake of our souls we need to give. Not only for the advancement of God's work and the good of needy people, but also for our own spiritual health.

This is exactly how C.S. Lewis dealt with the matter in his life. Though few people know it, Lewis lived a very modest life and spent very little on himself. He gave away the royalties from his books to a foundation set up for this purpose. Again and again, needy students at Oxford would find anonymous gifts of money slipped under their doors.

How much should we give? Lewis suggested it is better to consider the manner in which we should give. "I do not believe anyone can settle how much we ought to give. I am afraid the only safe rule is to give more than we can spare. In other words, if our expenditure on comforts, luxuries, amusements, etc., is up to the standard common among those with the same income as our own, we are probably giving away too little. If our charities do not at all pinch or hamper us, I should say that they are too small. There ought to be things we should like to do and cannot do because our charitable expenditure excludes them. I am speaking now of 'charities' in the common way."

Giving can be a great joy and an exciting adventure if we will follow the teaching of Jesus and the example of C.S. Lewis. And, it will help us grow deeper in a living faith in God.

Adult Hypertension Clinic

Do you want to volunteer with adults? The Herndon Free Clinic is starting a hypertension clinic for low income uninsured adults. This clinic will meet on alternate Thursdays in the clinic area at Herndon Middle School. This clinic will need medical personnel (physicians, nurses and nurse practitioners) to perform initial physical exams and medical histories. There will be a need for interpreters (especially Spanish) and for community volunteers to act as receptionists and administrative assistants. To volunteer, call the clinic voicemail at 703-481-8160. Leave your name and phone number. A volunteer will call you back to schedule orientation. Be sure to say you are interested in the adult clinic.

Let's Prevent the Spread of 'Bugs' at HUMC

Have you seen the new hand gel dispensers hanging on the walls in many of our HUMC classrooms and activity rooms? These dispensers when pressed give you a small amount of hand gel, which you may use to 'cleanse' your hands of up to 99.9% of bacteria or germs (according to the Centers for Disease Control). Just rub the gel over your palms, back of hands and fingers until your hands are dry. Hand washing is the number one way to prevent the spread of disease.

When soap and water are not readily available, please use the hand gel before eating, handling food, shaking hands, or before any close activity with others. Also, you may wish to use hand gel after sneezing, coughing or wiping your nose! We are all a 'little crowded' in our HUMC building.... Use the hand gel and help keep your Christian family healthy!!----
