The last week of July, Herndon UMC sent an excited mission team composed of Jay and Kylee Horstman, Sam Medvene, and Brianna Hogan Medvene to Costa Rica to work alongside Costa Rica Mission Projects (CRMP). CRMP was founded by Missionary and NC native Wil Bailey and his wife, Yolanda in 2003. CRMP was created to help foster long-lasting and mutually beneficial relationships between participating congregations, and Herndon UMC has been fortunate to be partnered with them for almost two decades! Wil and Yolanda live in San Isidro, Costa Rica. Through their local church and the greater Methodist Church of Costa Rica, they have built a strong foundation which includes a network of pastors in the area. As a result, churches in the United States have an opportunity not only to connect with each other and with CRMP, but also to serve

alongside churches throughout the southern zone of Costa Rica.



These relationships create a beautiful opportunity to come together in fellowship to worship, pray, serve, and be witnesses to Christ. This year, in addition to seeing several old CRMP friends, we had the pleasure of making new friends from Kansas and Rocky Mount, North Carolina! Ranging in age from 12 to 79, we worked together alongside a community in Santa Marta to construct a new parsonage and Sunday School classrooms. Jay and Kylee helped build the new Sanctuary in Santa Marta last year and it was wonderful to worship together in the new sanctuary on Sunday morning.



Although our Herndon UMC team usually focuses on the construction side of CRMP's

ministry, CRMP has several other active ministries that we have participated with in the past—and always have the option of participating with in the future! These ministries include a daycare (a safe space for a child that also allows mothers to go to school or work during the day), student housing (past HUMC volunteers help build apartments for young female students who otherwise could not afford to live in the city), and a robust counseling program focusing on at-risk women in the San Isidro Community. For the latter, CRMP employs a licensed psychologist and the program has been so well received there is currently a waiting list! While volunteers are living at the Missions and Ministry Center in San Isidro, they have the opportunity to witness these equally important ministries in action.

Herndon UMC is already looking forward to returning to Costa Rica next summer and invites anyone who may be interested to reach out to Jay Horstman for more information! You don't have to do construction work to serve with our Costa Rica Mission Partners; there are many ways to support their ministries and we would love to chat more with you!

Growing Spirit-filled Relationships

Dranesville Elementary School is in full blown renovation and won't be doing **Backpack Foods** this year. They hope that we would be able to support them as soon as they are able to bring the program back! So we won't be doing any backpack food packing this fall. Instead we will be adding another dinner for the Cornerstones shelter.

Temporary Overnight Shelter

Last year, we experienced an increase in the number of Hypothermia Prevention Dinners needed for each meal.


In July, Cornerstones, in coordination with Fairfax County and the Hunter Mill District Supervisor's Office, opened a new Temporary Overnight Shelter (TOS). This shelter, provides a warm, dry, safe space for homeless individuals to spend the night, will be held in the same space as the hypothermia program in

the winter, and will serve an estimated 60 individuals per evening, 7 days a week, year-round.

Cornerstones plans to provide the individuals in the TOS with a warm meal before they settle in for the evening, and that is the reason I am contacting you today. We are looking for donors to help provide these meals and are asking for enough food for 75 people per night so that there will be second helpings available for the individuals expected for dinner. The meals will need to be delivered to the shelter between 5:30 and 5:45 in the evening, just as with the hypothermia meals.

Herndon UMC's first TOS dinner will be in late September. There are many ways to participate or learn more—at the Fair, at the September 18 Worship & Fellowship Dinner, and through donations or volunteering for the dinner.

The Closet | Celebrating 50 Years

As the Closet celebrates 50 years of serving our community they invite us all into the story of how they have grown with our community.

The Closet Voucher Program

Since The Closet's founding in 1974, the voucher program has been a key aspect of the nonprofit thrift shop's community outreach. One reason local congregations wanted to establish a consolidated community thrift shop, rather than individual clothes closets at various houses of worship, was to serve the influx of Vietnamese refugees fleeing that war-torn nation. And in those early days, if The Closet didn't have appropriate clothing items available, such as undergarments, clients were directed to a local shop to find them, at The Closet's expense.

Fifty years later, the voucher program continues to grow and expand, its clientele a reflection of our very diverse community. Clients are referred by local government and nonprofit social service agencies or our member congregations. In 2023, the voucher program distributed more than \$118,000 in clothing and household goods, serving approximately 2,000 people per session (spring/summer and fall/winter). What an amazing resource for those in need, supported by our bighearted shoppers, generous donors, caring volunteers and hardworking staff!

The Closet Grant Program

When The Closet opened its doors, no one could predict how successful the organization would be. Still, the founders pledged to reinvest The Closet's profits in the local community, and

our Board of Directors has championed that promise. Starting in 1976, The Closet began contributing to worthwhile local groups. The first grant recipients were Herndon-Reston FISH and LINK. The Closet continues to support these Herndon-Reston community groups, but as our profits have grown the grants program has expanded to include organizations like Vecinos Unidos serving the growing Hispanic community and other groups, such as She Believes in Me and All Ages Read Together, focused on specific needs such as empowering girls and improving reading skills.

Since 1976, The Closet has distributed more than \$2.5 million in grants to local nonprofits serving the western Fairfax County and eastern Loudoun County areas, extending The Closet's reach far beyond its thrift shop patrons and establishing itself as a resource for other nonprofits.

The Closet: Growing Up with the Community

Over the last five decades, The Closet has grown from a small, three-days-a-week, all-volunteer thrift shop operating out of a couple of unused church classrooms to a thriving operation with 18 full- and part-time employees occupying our own building and welcoming the public to shop six days a week. What has never changed is The Closet's commitment to serving the needy and vulnerable members of our community.

The Closet has distributed more than \$2.5 million to the community in the form of grants to local nonprofits and more than \$779,000 in the form of scholarships to local high school students. We have given away more than \$1.3

million in clothing and household items to clients referred by social service agencies. Our truck ministry to the Shenandoah Valley has provided tens of thousands of dollars' worth of clothing and other items to communities that lack the resources of Northern Virginia. And, perhaps most importantly, our thrift shop has always been here in the community, offering low prices and quality merchandise to all comers – those in need or on a tight budget, bargain hunters, collectors, re-sellers, regardless of color, creed or religion. And, with your support, we will continue doing so for decades to come.

Fall Worship

Since the back-to-school kickoff we have been exploring challenges of faith that can lead us feeling uncomfortable. Upcoming sermon series, as we lead up to Thanksgiving, will touch on Stewardship and Generosity. Look for more to come about how discipleship and stewardship are connected. Our worship times continue to be:

8 am | Every Sunday | Outside* (until Oct 13)

The 8 am worship service draws special energy from being outside. Bring a chair and join together in this shorter service under the sun. (* Look for us in the Sanctuary, if it rains.) Help is needed for set up and take down and to get the coffee set up for fellowship time. The service will stay outside until October 13, look for possible changes after that.

10 am | Every Sunday | Sanctuary & YouTube Worship together in the Sanctuary every Sunday 10 am, or join the 10 am service live or

later on <u>YouTube</u>. Please show your support by your presence and your support in volunteering to help make the service happengreeting, refilling/putting away coffee, reading, offering music, helping with technology, etc.

4 pm | First Sundays | Sanctuary

This monthly evening service will continue to be offered at 4 pm on the first Sunday of each month. Join Pastor SeongJae for this additional opportunity to worship.

6 pm | Third Wednesdays | Doe Fellowship Hall

The Worship & Fellowship Dinners are a great way to highlight and support different missions while praising God and eating together in fellowship. The upcoming dates are:

Some Notes from Leadership

The Resource Management Team (RMT) has been working to find a new Children's Ministries Director and to conduct staff reviews. As we say farewell to Luis Gonzalez on September 8, the work is already underway to find a replacement for Luis that serves the needs of our music programs.

A special, Called Charge Conference was held on June 30 after the 10 am worship service. This Charge Conference approved salaries for pastors for the coming year and the 2024-25 fiscal year budget of \$820,281 (as compared to \$946,979 for FY 2023-24). This 2024-25 budget was approved with the Charge Conference recognizing the need to increase income more than \$45,000 over the year through intentional increase in building use and through stewardship.



Members who represented Herndon UMC and the Northern Virginia District shared their experiences from the Virginia Annual Conference at the Called Charge Conference in June.

The **Trustees** were busy over the summer.

Special thanks to Herndon UMC Preschool for supporting the new carpet in the preschool and hallways around the Sanctuary. This has led to a flurry of painting of hallways, around doors and windows. Thanks to Cathy McCranie for taking on the painting project.

A number of trees around the property were trimmed or removed (if dead) around the property. Additionally, there was emergency removal of dead tree limbs over the playgrounds.

The HVAC Unit that serves a number of classrooms along the hallway near Doe Fellowship Hall (rooms 106-110) has failed. A replacement has been ordered and will be installed when available. The cost of this new unit is \$21,000 that will be taken from the Trustees Maintenance Fund. This will bring the fund balance down to \$47,000.

You may have noted some work on the courtyards. The Sanctuary courtyard was cleaned up by Kim Via before the start of the Preschool school year. The Fellowship Hall courtyard has been an Eagle Scout project supervised by Cathy McCranie.

Just before Summer Musical Theatre Camp the new sound board was installed in Doe Fellowship Hall. There is also a new soundboard for the Sanctuary and to help address technical issues in worship, there are projects underway to build a new soundbooth for the whole team in the Sanctuary and to hardwire the screens in the Sanctuary.
